

Advanced Placement Program

Under the direction of The College Board, the Advanced Placement program is a national program designed to ease the transition between high school and college by providing standards so that high schools can align their curricula in order that all students can ultimately be successful. Upon completion of these courses, students are tested and, if successful, are awarded college credit accepted by most universities nationwide. AP exams are given in May whereby a student may earn up to 6 hours college credit for each exam depending on his/her score and the university's policy for credit by examination.
